
## **History Comes Alive: 7th Grade Field Trip**


## **Rounding the Roundabout**

Recently, at the intersection between highway 50 and 281, the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) began construction on a roundabout. The idea behind the roundabout was to make the intersection less deadly and improve safety. Due to the high traffic of oversized trailers, it will not be a typical shape. There will be a center circle for regular-sized vehicles (cars and trucks) and a large angle road for oversized vehicles (semis hauling wind turbines). "The concept is the same but there are a few differences," Jamie says. "Right now it is curing for 28 days and then they will finish the final touches." She states that the new fountain will hold the same amount of water as the old one. Jamie and the contractors believe that the work was done well and they hope for it to last another 106 years, if not longer! The original fountain was dedicated to Tom Moseley and named "The Moseley Memorial Fountain" in October of 1913.








### **Ready, Set, Run!**
