Simon Senek, in his book Start with Why, talks about how businesses and organizations know exactly what they do and how they do it. The most successful organizations know WHY they do what they do and communicate that clearly.

As a school staff, we have been discussing this concept. Obviously our WHY is students, but it goes deeper than that. Ultimately our purpose is to ensure students leave our school system and are able to be successful in whatever it is they choose to do. But deeper than that, successful students contribute positively to our community and society. So our purpose, our WHY, is to make our community a better place.

As we move toward spring break, I reflect on the last three years as we navigated through a global pandemic. In March of 2020, it was announced during spring break that schools would be closed for the remainder of the school year. School districts had to figure out how to provide "remote" learning and families had to learn to deal with that challenge at home. The following school year, we had to work through mask mandates, hybrid learning, and quarantines. It was a challenging school year, but was much better than keeping kids at home. Then last school year, we still had some of the same lingering issues to deal with, but we pretty much returned back to normal in January.

While it seems like now we have been operating as we did pre-Covid for some time, we really are not very far removed from it. This is actually the first "normal" school year we have had. It is crazy to think that the only year our graduating seniors will have had in high school without significant disruptions is this year.

Over the last three years, we were forced to shift our WHY from student success to just keeping the doors open and keeping everyone safe. Obviously that shift was not good for our true mission of ensuring students are successful. One can make value judgements about what should have been done with Covid at the local, state, and national levels. At this point, the only thing that matters moving forward is that we keep student success always at the center of our WHY.

There is a big push in the Kansas legislature to privatize education. Similar bills are being debated in states around the country. I often question why many legislators in our state are attacking public schools and pushing to incentivize families to remove their kids from public education. The WHY here is very simple: money. The is a lot of money to be made by private companies to provide students with an education. This is why we are seeing a national effort here.

The USD board of education passed a resolution speaking out against sending public tax dollars to private schools and home schools that have zero accountability for use of public funds. This is not to say that private schools or home schools are bad. There is just no oversight into what is taught and how public money is spent. I hope our legislators ask real questions about these voucher programs and understand WHY they are being pushed by special interest groups from outside our state.

Early education is an important focus for our district. It's critical that students enter Kindergarten ready to learn. Our district offers free preschool for all students ages 3 and up. All new preschool students MUST attend a screening to be eligible to attend our preschool. The screenings help us identify specific student needs and help us plan for the upcoming school year.

There will be a preschool screening on Friday, April 14th from 9:00-2:00 at the Ida Long Goodman Memorial Library in St. John. Call 620-672-7500 to schedule an appointment. Other screenings are available but this is the only one held in St. John. Kindergarten roundup is scheduled for April 21st. Information has been sent to preschool families. Contact the elementary office with any questions.

ASSESSMENT SEASON IS DRAWING NEAR!

With Spring comes the excitement of special activities and events, new sports seasons, field trips, and other special programs. However, this is also one of the most essential academic periods for our students. It is during this final quarter of the year that we have the opportunity to assess the growth and learning of our students in a number of different ways. Teachers gather classroom measures of achievement, we administer a final round of benchmark testing to measure foundational skills in reading and math, and, as most of you know, students get the chance to take end of year Kansas State Assessments!

Some of you may wonder why I put an excited exclamation point at the end of a sentence about state testing... I truly do see this as a meaningful way for our students to demonstrate a number of different skills. Not only are they measured on mastery of content standards, but they are also able to display their ability to attend to a task, their willingness to approach these requirements with a seriousness of purpose, their grit and perseverance in dealing with a difficult task, as well as certain test taking strategies that will benefit them in their life outside of school. Think about all the tests we take as adults-certifications, college exams, jobbased skills tests, even the privilege of getting a driver's license is a high stakes test! The more practice we have in a safe environment like an elementary classroom, the more likely we are to be emotionally prepared for and successful in taking tests for the rest of our lives. While this is a small measure of ---



what our students know and can do, it is still an important part of their academic preparation and we are excited about these elements of the testing season.

My request of our families and community is that you help our students join in this excitement about this chance to show what they know. Although the four performance categories reported in our state level data are limited, teachers and families are provided with numerical student scores within each of these ranges. Even moving a student's needle one point in the right direction is a success to celebrate! The more we diminish stress and build confidence, the better the mindset of our test takers and teachers will be.

Throughout this school year, I have seen tremendous amounts of growth in our students both academically and social-emotionally. We have so many things to celebrate and so many achievements to hang our hats on. We look forward to partnering with all of you to make this assessment season a joyful time that provides a positive sense of accomplishment. As always, together we are the village it takes to raise our children and we sincerely appreciate all of the support our families and communities provide.

91 STUDENTS ENTERED NATIONWIDE GOOGLE CONTEST



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
6TH GRADERS BEGIN POLLINATOR GARDEN










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




2ND GRADERS USING MATH WRAP UPS
