As we move into the colder months, we are seeing a lot of sickness going around. We've had an absentee rate of over $20 \%$ here at the end of November and beginning of December. It's not all related to Covid. We have influenza, strep, and a stomach bug running through the school. I'd like to encourage parents to keep kids home if they are sick and contact the school nurse if you'd like a Covid test.

As far as Covid goes, we all just want it to be over. I've been asked many times when things will get back to normal. What does normal even look like? I think whenever we can get to the point where we are no longer quarantining people that are not sick, it will feel pretty normal. I do not have a timeline or specifics as to when or how this might happen. But we will continue to tweak our protocols as we move forward with our goal to keep everyone safe and keep kids in school. Updated protocols are available on our website.

In past years, we worked with a company called Providence to use trained dogs to search the school campus for anything illegal or unsafe. We then started using the St. John PD for this service. But with changes in personnel, the police department is no longer able to provide that service for us. We will once again be working with Providence this year to help keep our campus safe and drug-free.

## A SOLEMN DAY

I was a Tactical Communications Specialist in the U.S. Army. The Units I've been in are 1st Infantry Division, 3rd Infantry Division, 6-52 Air Defense Artillery, and the U.S. Army Europe Soldiers Chorus as a Bass Player. That last Unit was a special duty station that I had to audition for, and not a Combat unit. I earned my Combat Patch while in the 3rd ID. We staged in Kuwait in January 2003, trained for 2 months, and on March 20th, we crossed into Iraq taking the western route. I won't go into detail about what happened during that time, but it was a life-changing event that will never leave my memory. I'll just say that war is brutal and leave it at that. People always say "thank you for your service", and while it is a nice gesture, it is unnecessary.

I joined the Army in September 1999 and wanted to serve my country and learn discipline, and what the Army calls LDRSHIP (yes, the acronym is pronounced Leadership). It comprises of Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Selfless Service, Honor, Integrity, and Personal Courage. The Army is a fantastic way to learn life skills, meet great people, and travel the world. I spent 5 years in Germany and it was an absolute blast!

Veterans Day is a solemn day for me. While Memorial Day is to honor the fallen, Veterans Day is meant to celebrate the ones that made it back home. For me, the 2 days are really combined as 1 . Both days, I remember those we lost, and those that came back home with a heartbeat. I say heartbeat, because not every Combat Veteran returned with visible injuries. Post Traumatic Stress is real thing, that causes more and more problems as time goes on, if not treated properly. I am humbled by those that came before me, honored to serve with those beside me, and appreciate those that have taken up the mantle after me and beyond. Sergeant Mixon signing out.

# FIRST TIME AT FHSU MATH RELAYS

On November 1lth, my husband and I took 8 students to the FHSU Math Relays.This was a first time experience for all of the students and they weren't sure what to expect. Although they were nervous to start with, most came back saying "that wasn't too bad" after their first test. They also got to experience a fire alarm during the middle of one of the tests!

Each student competed in four tests against students in their grade from 30 other schools from across the state. Most tests had between 30 and 60 individuals and $15-20$ teams in each grade. Each test was 20 minutes and students could take the test either as an individual or as a 3 -person team. Scores were determined by the number of questions answered correctly minus 0.25 times the number of questions answered incorrectly. The top 3 students and teams in each test received medals while the top 6 students and top 6 teams in each grade were awarded team points for each test. Schools were then sorted by classification and ranked according to total team points.

I am very proud of how the students performed. Although St. John-Hudson did not have any top 3 placings, there were several top 10 finishes. The freshmen team consisting of Aden Adame, Willow Murphy, and Quade Smith placed 8th in Number Sense and 4th in Algebraic Manipulations. Willow Murphy also placed 8th as an individual in Calculations with Calculators. The 10th grade team consisting of Ian Dunn, Eli Foote, and Quade Smith (doing double duty) placed 7th in Geometry. Eli Foote placed 7th in Number Sense and 6th in Applications of Algebra while Ian Dunn placed 10th in Applicat-
ions of Algebra. while Ian Dunn placed 10th in Applications of Algebra. Seniors Elijah Delp, Preston Dunn, and Conner Murphy placed 6th as a team in Number Sense and 9th in Algebraic Manipulations. The students, as an overall team, ended up placing 7th out of 14 for 1 A students which was impressive since no juniors attended.

I am glad students were willing to go and I hope to take more students next year!

This year seems to be more hectic, partially due to the added chaos in the world over the past 2 years. Events that we have no control over. Instead of focusing on the pressures of the end of a semester, I'd like to use this as an opportunity to highlight just a few of our successes and celebrate some of the great things our students and staff are doing.

Our Residential Carpentry class, taught by Mr. Moritz, has been working on a house on Broadway that was donated by Tom and Sabrina Garner. This opportunity is giving our students some excellent real world work experience. They spent most of last year on planning and demolition. This process included stripping everything inside down to the stud walls, planning for floor plan changes and removing unwanted walls and moving some stairs.


They also did some wiring, plumbing and sewer work. This year they are in the construction phase and are currently adding new walls, replacing some concrete floor in the basement, more wiring and plumbing and adding insulation. They will soon be adding drywall. As this project continues to come together we will add updates on our Facebook page.

This year we were able to bring Spanish back to our classroom with the addition of Mrs. Ixchel Mixon, who serves as Spanish Language aide. Her students are learning some valuable conversational skills as they learn the language. We are also fortunate that Mrs. Mixon is skilled in technology and is also facilitating an Interactive Media class. It is under her guidance that this class produces this very newsletter. Last but not least of the things that Mrs. Mixon brings to our school is her ability to effectively interpret for our Spanish speaking families. This has been identified as a growing need for our district and we are excited about being able to offer this service.

At the beginning of November Natalie Clark took over teaching our Business department. She has done an outstanding job and is bringing some great opportunities for our students. Under her direction the Consumer Personal Finance class is learning the value of financial literacy and financial planning. She is getting her Business Essentials class out in the community at various businesses doing interviews and learning about what it takes to be an entrepreneur. They are also working with the FACS department on an in-school business. More on that later...

In the Family and Consumer Sciences department, Mrs. Patterson added a Baking and Pastry class this year. There are currently 15 students in the class. On Fridays during LS these students have baked goods (Tiger Treats) available to students and staff. Some of-
the proceeds have been given to different groups to help with fundraising. This summer Mrs. Patterson also received barista training. Her classes and Mrs. Clarks classes are in the process of doing the research to start a coffee shop out of the FACS room. The research has included cost analysis, student/staff surveys and taste tests. We look forward to that opening soon.

We were recently able to complete construction of the Greenhouse in our courtyard. This structure replaces the student built greenhouse that we had in there before. This greenhouse gives us a more permanent structure with more square footage for use. Mr. Delps Environmental Wildlife Resources classes have added Talapia to the tank and will soon be utilizing the greenhouse for studying growth of different plants. Throughout the year we have plans for other grade levels and classes to use this space for various curricular activities.


We also have had some great accomplishments in our Fine Arts departments. Just a few of these include: A very successful production of the musical Mamma Mia under the direction of Mrs. Hacker and Ms. B., a first place entry against some very large schools by Mr. Knights AV Productions class, Ms. Behnke's students placing high in the Trash-ToTrends fashion show and the selection of several Junior High and High School students to SWKMEA Honor Band and Honor Choir.

We have a lot of great things going on in our schools and the previous paragraphs outline just a few of those.
