

--- will dismiss at 11:00 that day and lunch will not be served. Preschool and Kindergarten graduations will go on as scheduled on the calendar.

Education is vastly different than it was 100 years ago and what it means to be a teacher has evolved. A common definition for teaching is to *impart knowledge*. Technology has made it possible to have unlimited knowledge at our fingertips. The days are gone of the teacher having all of the knowledge and transferring that to students.

Research still shows that the most important factor in the success of a student is the effectiveness of the teacher in the classroom. The time that we were forced to do "remote" learning has only reinforced that fact. While technology tools can make teaching and learning more dynamic and effective, it cannot replace what teachers do for students every day.

In May we celebrate teacher appreciation week. I want to express thanks to all of the teachers at USD 350 for choosing to make a difference in the lives of our kids. I would encourage you all to reach out to a teacher to express appreciation for the great work they do with our kids.

As the legislative session comes to a close, there was talk of adding funding for special education to bring that up to the level required by law. With the state's budget projected to end with a \$2.7 billion surplus, many thought this was the time to fix this \$150 million gap in funding. While base aid has been increasing in recent years, special education funding has not been keeping up with increased costs.

Kansas law requires that the state cover 92% of the excess costs for special education.

Currently, the state only appropriates enough to cover 72% of excess costs. The result is that our special education co-op must assess local districts a higher fee to cover that funding gap. We pay an additional \$124,000 from our general fund to make up that difference. If state funding were provided according to statute, that \$124,000 would be freed up for other uses in our general fund budget.





KINDERGARTEN CHICK PROJECT

Both kindergarten classes incubated and hatched chicken eggs this month! Funding for the incubation project was provided by Tiger Town and the Enrichment Foundation and Mr. Norman Cooper provided the chicken eggs. Alicia Boor from the Barton County Extension Office helped the kindergarteners label and set all 24 eggs on April 5th. As part of our Tiger Town grant project, the kindergarten students were able to go to Tiger Town on the afternoon of April 11th where they learned about how a pizza is made, ingredients, and measuring. Mrs. Boor returned again on April 18th to candle the eggs and monitor chick progress. After candling the eggs, the kindergarten students had 14 eggs fertilized and developing that were appropriately. On Monday, April 25th our Bantam eggs (which have a shorter incubation period, made their first pip, which is the first crack in the egg to start the hatching process. On Tuesday, April 26th, three Bantam chicks were waiting for the students when they arrived that morning. Kindergarten and preschool students were able to watch the first larger egg hatch live! Throughout the day, more chicks hatched!



A HISPANIC EASTER: CASCARONES

Around Easter time, you may see children, as well as adults, running after each other with colored eggs in their hands, which then explode into confetti when they hit their desired target. These are called cascarones, or "confetti eggs". According to historians, cascarones originated in China. It is rumored that Marco Polo first brought them to Italy, and on to Spain, and they eventually made their way to the Americas. In the beginning, the eggs were quite elegant and valuable; instead of confetti, they were filled with perfumed powders, making them popular with high-society women.

They became quite popular in Mexico in the 1860s, after Emperor Maximiliano's wife, Carlotta, introduced them to the country. In Mexico, the powders were replaced with confetti and given their name "cascarones," the plural form of "cáscara," which means shell in Spanish.




